Land Survey: A portion of Benjamin Page's land with the parish's intended church/school. July 1, 1842: St-Gabriel-de-Brandon, Quebec.

On this first day of July, in this year of our Lord One Thousand, eight hundred and forty two, at the request of Benjamin Page, I the undersigned sworn Land Surveyor certify that I have laid off, and bounded in due form of Land, on a Lot or Farm of Land belonging to, and in possession of the aforesaid Benjamin Page on the South east border of the Lake Maskinongé in the Township of Brandon: an Emplacement or portion of ground, (on which there is a building in progress intended to serve as a place of worship, and school—house), of five french perihis in the breadth, by ten similar perihis in depth, and forming an area of half a french arpent; being bounded in front by the high—way wheit intersects the said Page's Farm, on the north east side by Line of Seperation with François Decoigne, and on the south west, and south east sides, by the Land of the said Benjamin Page.

I further certify that I have planted and established a stone borne or boundary with pieces of earthern ware underneath at each angle of the said emplacement with the exception of the angles formed by the high—way and the Line of division with the above mentioned François Decoigne, and that I have measured and bounde the said emplacement—in the manner aboved described in the presence of the said Benjamin Page, proprietor, David Armstrong one of the Irustees for the building above alluded to, and of Ruggles Armstrong, and Charles Dunn, special witnesses.

In faith of which I have given the present <u>Prous Verbal</u>, which the aforesaid parties have signed along with me.
