Pre-Coronation Celebration – May 5, 2023

Welcome

Good afternoon and welcome to you all.

I am Robert Wilkins, the President of Heritage Branch, which is the Montreal chapter of The United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada, the sponsor of this Pre-Coronation Celebration.

First, I must thank the Macdonald Stewart Foundation and its Executive Director, Major Thomas Leslie, for allowing the use of this beautiful mansion for our Celebration. His operatic voice has already thrilled us, accompanied by the talented pianist Diana Wall, and he will lead us later in singing our Royal and National Anthems.

It is with great joy that we greet our guest of honour, the Honourable J. Michel Doyon, Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec, His Majesty's official representative in our Province. His Honour has travelled from Quebec City to join us today and deliver a special message on this historic occasion. We also welcome his chef de cabinet, Mr. Jean-François Provençal, and his aide-decamp.

We are delighted as well that some members of our sister-branch, the Sir John Johnson Centennial Branch of the UELAC have joined us today from the Eastern Townships. That delegation is led by my good friend and colleague, Michel Racicot of Cowansville.

Looking out from this lectern, I see a great many friendly faces from different groups and associations, such as the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal, the Irish Protestant Benevolent Society, the Royal Commonwealth Society, the Atwater Library, the 78th Fraser Highlanders Regiment and the Black Watch Regiment. In addition, I wish to greet some personal friends of my wife Maura and me who support our constitutional monarchy and want to celebrate here and now in Montreal the big event that will take place in London tomorrow – an event we have not seen for seven decades and which may never happen again in our lifetimes.

Descendants of United Empire Loyalists have a special reason for rejoicing at tomorrow's coronation, because King Charles will be ascending the same throne once occupied by his fifth great-grandfather, George III – the king the Loyalists honoured, to whom they remained loyal despite persecution during the American Revolution, under whose colours (the Queen Anne flag displayed here) they fought and who finally migrated northwards in the thousands so as to continue living under British rule. They were the first group of political refugees in Canadian history,

seeking the blessings of peace, security, civil rights, the rule of law and freedom under the Crown. They set the pattern for so many later groups of political refugees who have come to Canada in the last two centuries in quest of those same blessings.

Today, for all Canadians – regardless of their ancestry – the monarchy remains an indispensable component of our parliamentary democracy, as well as a key feature of our national identity.

INTRODUCTION

Our guest of honour is superbly qualified to comment on the monarchy and its relevance today. His CV lists so many accomplishments that I must summarize it, owing to time limitations.

Educated first at Laurentian University, His Honour went on to earn a Master's, a law degree and a doctorate in History, coupled with doctoral studies in Philosophy, at Université Laval. Today he is governor of its foundation.

conseils d'administration de nombreux organismes sans but lucratif, notamment Radio-Canada-CBC, de 1988 à 1998, ainsi que de plusieurs fondations. Parmi ses nombreuses autres réalisations, il est un ancien président de la Société historique de Québec.

In 1992, our Lieutenant-Governor became a Queen's Counsel and in 2009 was made an avocat émerite. In 2016, he was awarded the Médaille du Barreau, the Quebec Bar's highest distinction. In addition, he is the recipient of the Commemorative Medal for the 125th Anniversary of Canadian Confederation, as well as the Queen's Golden and Diamond Jubilee Medals. Apart from all that, he is Honorary Colonel of 3rd Wing of the RCAF in Bagotville, and holds several other military titles in various regiments. He is also Vice-Prior of the Order of St. John, Quebec Council.
